UofT Prof. David Hulchanski who has studied homelessness and housing for 40 years, says of HousingTO 2020-2030's "affordable" housing strategy: "Compared to the city's historical social housing supply, Toronto's current plan is "totally insignificant. Their goal averages out to around 4,000 new units a year, those units won't count as true social housing." "I call it fake affordable housing; it's market housing to help developers".
